On 4 June 1702 Samuel Howe gave to his 130 Acres of "New Grant son David Land" lying on the Boston Road, where David built his some. It was opened as a public house, first know as "The Howe Tavern" and then as "The Red Horse Tavern", and when immortalized by Longfellow, as "The Wayside Inn." It is the oldest operating Unn in the country.
